This fine group in uniform has horned its way through a very successful and beneficial year.

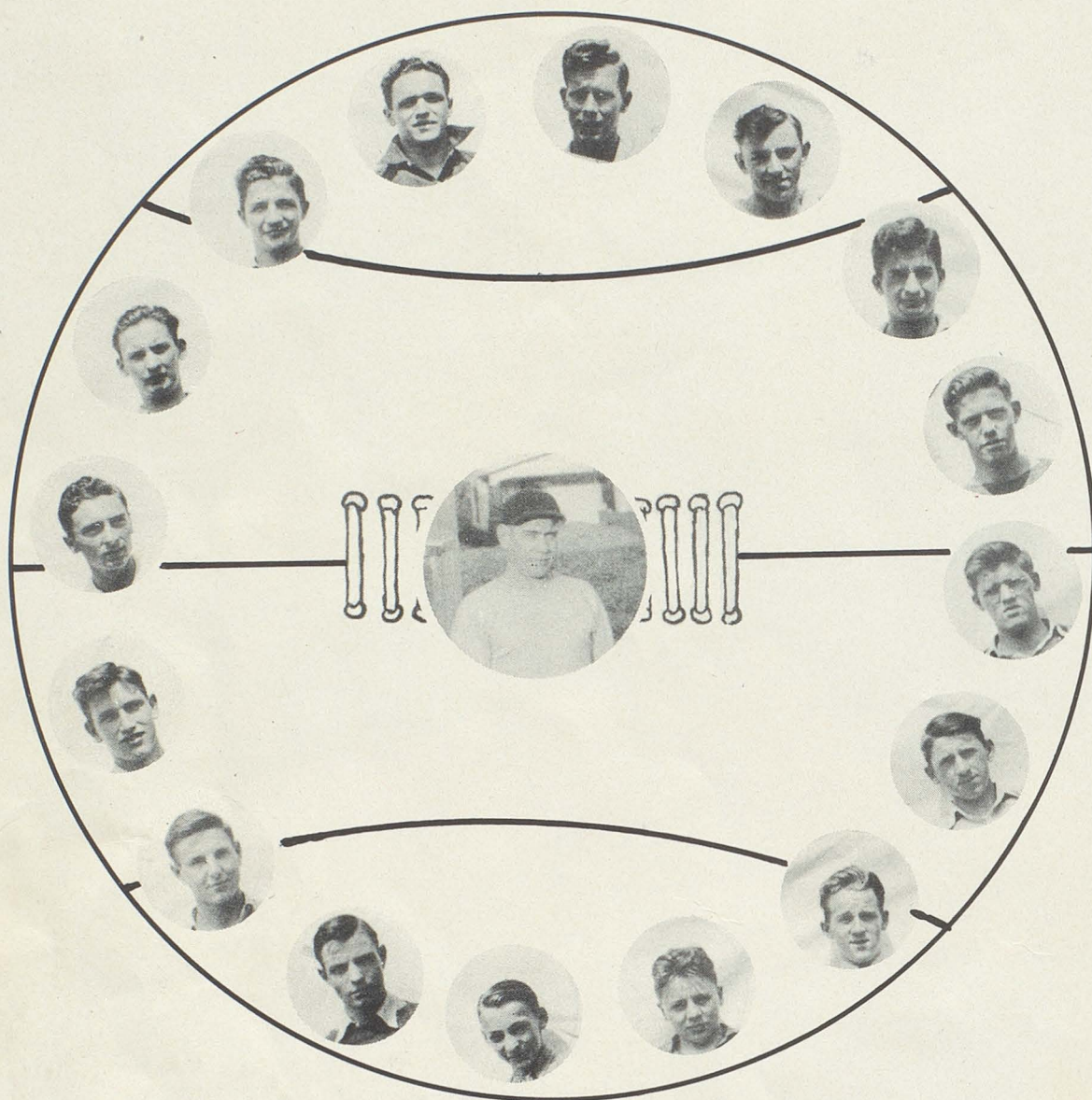
Under the direction of Mr. Puffenberger, the band has taken part in many successful programs, including the spring music contest of Northeastern Ohio.

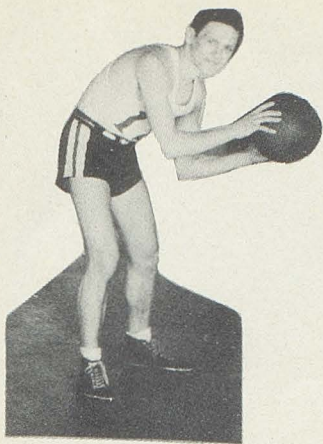
GLEE CLUB

CLASS HISTORY

Please be quiet! This was the greeting to a group of 41 not too green, freshmen in an overcrowded room of Canal Fulton High School in the year 1936.

These freshmen were not quiet and backward as freshmen should be, nor were they afraid of the upper classmen, at least not very afraid.

For class advisor we chose Miss Mary Hiltner, who has been with us all during our high school years.

We inaugurated our social activities as a class by holding our first class party in the auditorium. Prizes were given for the craziest hats. Everyone had a good time. This party also saw the beginning of several fine romances.

At last, the last day of school! The green freshmen are freshmen no more. Today we are Sophomores!

The first day of school in September, 1937, found our class increased to 46. We were joined by several people from Manchester: Mike Markovich, Irene Graham, William Beavers, Richard Shetler, Arwood Dickerhoof, June Harvey, Robert Ickes, and Mary L. Louis. Those who did not return to school were: Lovada Stuart, who is married and works in Canton; Graydon Buss, who is attending military school in South Carolina; William Griffith, who is attending East High School in Akron; and Solomon George, Carl Bremkamp, and Robert Ginther, who are working on farms.

Shortly after school started we held a skating party at Myers Lake.

This year was very successful from all angles, especially from the standpoint of athletics, as our basketball team won the state championship. We are proud to be able to say that one of our class members, Robert Shook, was on the team.

Then again came the day of judgment. The "silly" sophomores became "jolly" juniors.

The first day of school in September, 1938, found the group approximately the same, except noisier. Those who did not return were: Sylvia Volk, who transferred to school in Clinton; Gilbert Hill, who works on a farm; and June Harvey, who was married.

In October we picked our jackets which are cardinal and gray.

On December 3, we presented "Aunt Tillie Goes to Town." This was a great success. We had never realized how much acting ability we possessed in our class.

To raise money for our Junior-Senior banquet, we sold booster tags for license plates and had several bake sales.

On May 17, 1939, we had our banquet. We used a Dutch theme and the decorations were blue and white. There was plenty to eat and everyone had a very enjoyable evening.

The first day of school September 11, 1939, found the group that was once noisy freshies now carrying the title of "Sophisticated Seniors." Although not too sophisticated.

The former members who did not return were: Anna Mary Crone, who transferred to Washington High School in Massillon; Lillian Wood, who changed to Doylestown High School; Ethel Geseman married; Robert Richards works for the Davey Tree Surgery Company in Michigan; Robert Ickes moved to Akron; Harold Oser and Philip Netling work on farms; and J. T. Scott transferred to Coventry. Shortly after school started William Beavers also transferred to Coventry.

About two weeks after school started, we received our rings. We were all pleased with them, except a few boys who gave them away shortly afterward. Of course, there were rumors that they didn't give them away because they disliked them.

Before long we began preparations on our "Memory Book." Everyone had lots of fun working on it, but oh, the over-taxed brains. To make money for it, we had several bake sales, and sold magazines and canes with pennants.

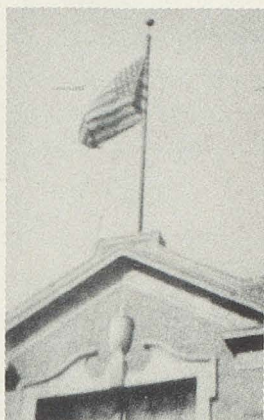
Late in the fall we had a party at Richard Shetler's. Everyone had a good time, and oh, the eats!

On May 3, 1940, we presented "The Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come," which was acclaimed the "best ever" by a number of people.

May 23, 1940, the junior class honored us with a very nice banquet. There was dancing, and plenty to eat for all. To the juniors, we say "Thanks."

Our Baccalaureate Services were held in the high school on May 26, 1940.
