


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MR. HARRY L. PELLEY Superintendent







DO YOU REMEMBER?

Through an icy-bordered window, exhibiting the full effects of winter, you are gazing into a comfortable living room of an average home. The time is mid-winter in the year 2000. Though fire places are no longer in vogue, a middle-aged couple sit placidly around the fire and seem to radiate a glow of inner warmth. They possess a love for things of a bygone age, and the fireplace signifies to them a means of relaxing and retracing the past. Who are they? You may call them Mr. and Mrs. Senior of the Class of 1957, graduates of Northwest High School. What are they doing? Why—retracing their high school days together—what else! The woman, Mrs. Senior, is holding a book in her hand as Mr. Senior gazes intently into the fire. He speaks in husky tones—

"I remember so well our freshman year at Clinton. We were all so new at this game of high school. I remember how excited we were when the sophomores, juniors, and seniors consolidated with Canal Fulton High School leaving us to be the oldest class at Clinton. Mr. Meecham became our class sponsor, and we elected Margie Wilhelm, Bill Stinson, Nancy Paul, and Helen Reece as our officers. Our class was quite active that year. Using the money we earned in our freshman year, we chartered a Greyhound bus and went to Columbus, Ohio, on our class trip. I don't think any students could have enjoyed their freshman year as much as we managed to do."

"Now, dear, that's just your opinion. I remember my own beginning of high school vividly. We freshmen from Canal Fulton were different in one respect. Whereas you were the oldest class remaining at Clinton, we were the youngest class at the new Northwest High School located in Canal Fulton. We began our year in the Fulton High School gym, designated as our homeroom, and elected Tom Culp, Sherry Gilcher, Marilyn Pauli, and Roy Ray as our officers. Mr. Rannigan and Mr. Prokop became our sponsors. Those nine months really flew! Do you remember when we celebrated the conclusion of our freshman year in a get-acquainted picnic at Clay's Park?"

"Do you recall the significance of our sophomore year? In the fall of 1954 the two former freshman classes combined to form one sophomore class at Northwest High School. Because of the crowded conditions in the Fulton High School building, we had to be divided alphabetically into two homerooms. Mr. Prata became our sponsor. We chose Marie LeBerth, Tom Culp, Sherry Gilcher, and Margie Wilhelm to officate at our class meetings. Remember when we chose our class jackets and rings? When our jackets arrived, we felt that we had really become a part of Northwest High. We really wore them everywhere? Remember the Beggar's Ball, our first classsponsored dance?"

"Yes, dear, those first two years were wonderful, but don't you agree that our junior and senior years offered the most challenge? I think the class grew under its new responsibility and each one of us tried to do his part to make our class a success."


"I certainly do agree! Our junior year was truly the busiest—so full of money-making schemes. After all, it was a matter of "do or die"! We had a prom that year to plan, and we certainly didn't sit around twiddling our thumbs about it. We worked. Under the able sponsorship of Mrs. Lawrence, without whom we couldn't have succeeded, we accumulated money through bake sales class dues, sales of megaphones, holding the football and basketball concessions, sales of ball point pens, sponsoring our January sixth dance, presentation of our junior play, and a scrap and paper drive. Our efforts were certainly rewarded in the success of our prom. We held our prom at the Onesto Hotel in Canton, Ohio, on May fifth. Our theme was "Memories Are Made of This" in a color scheme of blue and silver. Our banquet began at six in the Onesto ballroom, and everyone looked perfectly "chic" in his new finery. Do you recall Barb's and Jack's speeches. And remember the professional dancers from the Arthur Murray Studio? I'll never forget that all at once during the dancing, a mass of floating balloons descended on us and the commotion which followed."

"Leaving the Onesto we became a part of the train of cars driving to the Lincoln Theater in Massillon where we saw that movie, "The Conqueror", starring John Wayne and Susan Hayward. We concluded our night of nights with a breakfast at Northwest High School."

"Who were our officers that year? That's right. They were Jack Haney, Marie LeBerth, Margie Wilhelm, and John Shondel."

"Will you ever forget that fall of 1956 when we moved into the new building? It seems such a coincidence that we seniors were the first to graduate from the new Northwest High School—as if we were destined for that special honor. We elected Jack, Marie, Margie, and Tom Culp officers; Mrs. Lawrence our sponsor. We chose the red rose as class flower, blue and silver as class colors, and "The Reward of Effort is Success' as class motto. From then on it was: pictures, annual! invitations! robes! play! dance! baccalaureate! commencement! almost as fast as I can say it.



The Library Club, a new organization this year, is under the advisership of Mrs. Reppart. The student librarians work in the library and aid students in finding books and reference material.
















ORCHESTRA








PROM


