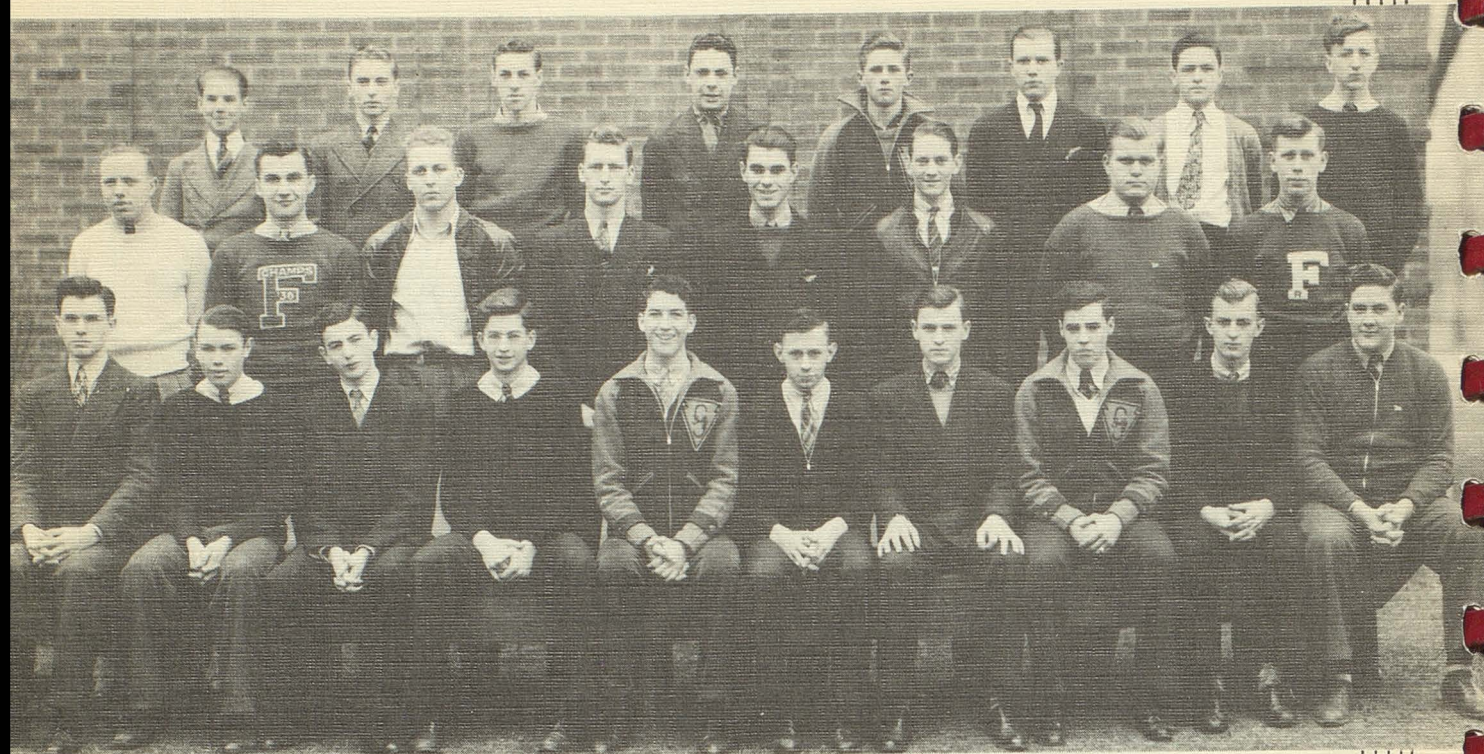
ACTIVITIES

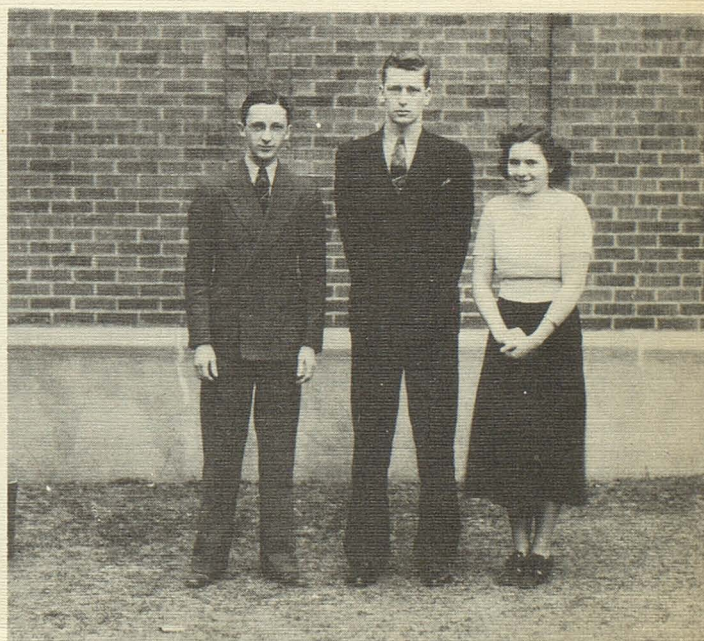
Our club was organized in 1932 and has a membership of twenty-four. Speakers both instructive and inspirational have assisted us in our programs this past year.

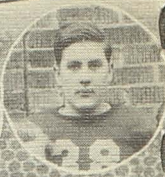




SPORTS
